The Jonesboro club is as vibrant as ever and continues to take on a number of core projects each year. This year we are taking on some new projects.

We have just completed a new classification list and plan to break the club into teams with a goal of bringing in new members. Each team will have the responsibility of bringing in at least one new member.

Another new idea this year is to set up a booth at the semi-annual Small Business Exposition to get some much needed publicity.

We hope that this will give the public the opportunity to ask questions about Rotary and how to join.

The third idea is to set aside a day to invite non-Rotarians to our weekly lunch meeting to educate them about the good work that Rotary does and hopefully recruit new members. We should feel obligated to pass this opportunity on to others.

Core projects: Weekly raffle to support Operation Smile - One ticket for \$1 or three tickets for \$2. Half of the proceeds go to Operation Smile and half goes to the winning ticket holder. We have been able to support a number of operations in this manner. Sanford/Lee Hunger Walk - We have in the past sponsored Crop Walk with the majority of the proceeds leaving our community.

With this in mind we decided to start the first annual Sanford/Lee Hunger Walk. We will be able to keep all funding in our community, allowing us to donate more funds to needy charities.

Golf Marathon - Players get pledges and play up to 100 holes of golf. Last year was our first attempt and a good time was had by all with a considerable amount of money being raised.

Annual Raffle - This is our largest fundraiser with a grand prize of \$10,000 and 9 consolation prizes valued at \$100-\$200. We will sell no more than 400 tickets at a cost of \$50 each and offer to charities in our community approximately \$9,000.

Take one meeting yearly to tour a local industry (toured Moen in Sanford this year). A lively delegation will attend District Conference in New Bern, and bring a nice gift to donate.

SAN-LEE

San-Lee Rotary is looking forward to continued fun, fellowship and progress in 2002. Our membership is now 31 and our attendance averages 86% or better. We meet each Monday at 7:00 am.

During this year we plan to continue our community service projects which this year include contributions of more than \$5,500 to the local YMCA, the Boys and Girls Home of Lake Waccamaw, NC, Christmas families, our \$500 yearly college scholarship and many others.

The club membership also gave support to our highway cleanup project and the local Rotary blood drive. Our Rotary International Project was a combined effort of the San-Lee, Jonesboro, Sanford and Siler City Rotary Clubs. This combined project provided contributions of \$8,130 to provide water storage cisterns for the Jaipur Pink City area in India. Halfway through the Rotary year 2001-02 finds the Siler City club growing with 8 new members who are energized and active and bringing the same energy to the rest of the membership.

Membership: We held our annual Lobster/Prime Rib Festival in November for our club membership and their significant others. We invited all the sponsors who have contributed to the Special Gift Fund of the Rotary Bazaar. We use this event as a recruiting tool to attract new people to Rotary.
