## ONE AT A TIME



As you read this, I am about three-fourths of the way along with my official DG visits to your clubs. This continues to be such a pleasant part of the Governor's job, as Missy and I have been so cordially received at every club. When we started the visits in early August, 48 seemed such a huge number but now we find

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ourselves strangely saddened that only a dozen or so calls remain to be made. What happened? How did that imposing number -- 48 clubs!! -- get whittled down to just a few left? It came about simply because we made the visits ONE at a time.

This is just another example of "Exercising the Power of ONE." As I have delivered my version of PDG Jack Green's infamous "12- page speech," I have occasionally thrown in an illustrative Power of ONE to make a point or to offer a suggestion for a way to get started on a club project or activity or as a means to provide some Rotary education in a particular subject area. A couple of examples: give encouragement to ONE "at risk" Rotarian in your club, attend ONE district event, if you have computer spend part of ONE hour on the RI website ([www.rotary.org](http://www.rotary.org)) to seek information on ONE unfamiliar program or topic -- and then share that information with ONE of your clubmates.

My bet is that if you exercise any of these Powers of ONE, or any others you can think up, you will be touched by the Magic of Rotary which will pull you into deeper service and broader involvement with the activities of your club and your community. ONE will become two and two will become three and the next thing you know you will understand my amazement when I very shortly visit that 48th club. All it takes is ONE at a time. Try it. Experience the Power of ONE.

Emphasize Vocational Service during October, "Vocational Service Month," and continue volunteer activities throughout the year by:

### Revisiting Goals of Vocational Service

Adherence to, and promotion of, the highest ethical standards in all occupations.

Recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations.

Contribution of Rotarians' vocational talents to the problems and needs of society-reduced unemployment, stronger workforce, literacy, career direction for young people.

Collaboration with business and industry, other civic groups, and community agencies to promote vocational service.

### Emphasizing Vocational Service during October and throughout the year by implementing your ideas and choosing from the following "menu" of service

Continue Vocational Service projects currently in place-projects that are working well (Job Shadowing, Career Fairs, Classroom Presentations, Youth Leadership Program, essay and speech contests, etc.) *Be aware that November is "National Career Development Month" for public schools. Continue vocational service efforts in November.*

Develop a video on techniques of effective job interviews. Produce and distribute to schools and colleges.

Incorporate professional ethics into classification talks of members.

Host a program on professional ethics during which members sign the "Declaration of Rotarians in Business

Recognize individuals and organizations that demonstrate high ethical standards and vocational excellence with the "Declaration of Rotarians in Business and Professions" award.

Provide assistance to the many dislocated workers throughout North Carolina. Volunteer in the local JOBLINK Center and in literacy/high school completion programs in community colleges.

Emphasize entrepreneurship/small business ownership through club programs and volunteer efforts.

Develop programs for public school teachers - **Awards Program for Teachers** who demonstrate a commitment to career development of young people and to professional ethics, **Teacher Shadowing Program** in which teachers "Shadow" Rotarians in their workplaces.

Host programs on employee assistance-health and wellness, substance abuse prevention and treatment, professional development, and services for workers with special needs.

The Alamance Club is the largest club in Area 3 with 48 members who will continue to sponsor students for the Jr. Police Academy and expand on their quarterly improvement award for at-risk children by including two more schools. In addition, they will continue their financial support for Habitat for Humanity, the Alamance Rescue Mission and Boys Scouts. Their major fundraiser is an annual golf tournament, however they are interested in additional fundraising opportunities.

## Alamance Breakfast **Larry Ware, Pres.**

The Alamance Breakfast Club supports Habitat for Humanity, provides scholarships for local high school students and is eager to establish an Interact Club at one of the local high schools. They have also nominated a rising senior from Elon College as a cultural scholar. ABRC supports these efforts through an annual golf tournament, paper sale, and pancake breakfast. They are proud to be a 100% Paul Harris Club and their attendance usually exceeds 90%.

The Burlington Club was chartered in 1925 and is the oldest club in Area 3. They are a big supporter of Reading is Fundamental for local elementary school students. They also provide a scholarship for a graduating high school senior and support many local charities through member contributions.

The Graham Club provides four scholarships to local high school and community college students, supports Back to Work programs at the Allied Churches Homeless Shelter and sponsors local youth football and baseball teams. They are also financially supporting the Afghan Ophthalmologist Project and the Sholoam Missionary Home. They are currently in the process of chartering two new Interact clubs at local high schools. Their major fundraisers are pork bbq shoulder sales in November and a golf tournament in the spring. The Graham Club is very committed to a net growth of 10% and attaining Gold Club status this year.

The Yanceyville Club has an annual omelet breakfast for seniors, they support the annual Fish-N-Fun Day by providing rods and reels to kids under 12 and teach them how to fish, they provide four college scholarships to local students, provide financial support to the Boy Scouts and local FAA chapter and support the Sprint Classic Golf Tournament. On the international level they are providing financial support to bring an Afghan ophthalmologist to study in the US for one month.
