As has been done each year, our resolve is to build upon the successes of this year.

This has been a phenomenal year for our clubs. Twenty clubs successfully followed the Governor's Gold Club map. Fifty percent of our clubs applied for the 2005-2006 Rotary International Presidential Citation. On the Foundation side of the equation, six clubs joined the 100% Paul Harris Fellow Club team, and we suspect the final tally for this year is not in. Two more clubs are about to join that number. District membership has grown by a couple dozen Rotarians. Although end-of-the-year roster purges will erode that number, we still project growth.

Each year brings its blessings and new challenges. This year the devastation caused by Hurricane Katrina caused an outpouring of concern across our district that resulted in a (cont. pg. 2)

Rotary District 7690 Nominates 2008-2009 Governor

The Rotary District 7690 Nominating Committee, chaired by Past District Governor Henry Brown, has nominated **Charles Allen** of the Randolph Rotary Club to serve as District Governor of Rotary District 7690 in 2008-2009. The committee would like to thank all of the candidates, Charles Allen of the Randolph Rotary Club, Michael Conrad of the Gate City Rotary Club and Wes Patterson of the Thomasville Rotary Club for their dedication to District 7690 and their willingness to serve.

The Rotary District 7690 Manual of Procedure and Policy states that:

Following the announcement no later than June 1 by the District Governor of the recommendation of the Nominating Committee to the clubs, any club in District 7690 may propose by way of resolution naming the candidate (whose name shall have been previously submitted to the Nominating Committee prior to the May 1st deadline) and certifying that the candidate meets the qualifications established by RI. If challenge candidates are received, the procedures for a mail ballot are determined by the Nominating Committee and ballots are mailed to the clubs. Any challenge must be received by July 1 and should be sent to the office of the District Governor. If no challenges are received by July 1, the candidate of the Nominating Committee shall be declared the DGN. If a mail ballot is necessary, the DG announces the results of the mail ballot by August 1, and the winner shall be declared the DGN.

JOHN WOMACK RECEIVES THE ROTARY FOUNDATION MERITORIOUS SERVICE CITATION

Rotary International says this about The Rotary Foundation Meritorious Service Citation:

"The vitality and success of the Rotary Foundation are dependent upon the work of individual Rotarians, thousands of whom each year make extraordinary contributions of time and effort."

To recognize this significant service the Trustees annually award The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service to not more than one Rotarian in each district. Because the Foundation has other means of recognizing significant financial support, those providing only monetary gifts are not eligible for this award. This award may be received only once and less than 200 Rotarians are honored each year."

John Womack (Furnitureland) is the eleventh Rotarian in District 7690 to receive this award. John has been very involved in Foundation activities ever since he visited Australia in 1971-1972 as a member of that year's Group Study Exchange team. He is passionate about the Group Study Exchange experience, but his area of expertise and his real passion is for the scholarship program. John begins recruiting students when they are in high school. He remains in touch with "his students" until they reach an appropriate stage in their academic careers and then he steers them towards the scholarship program. At a Zone Scholar Orientation two years ago, approximately one-third of the two dozen scholars thanked John by name for his role in introducing them to the program; he received a standing ovation from all the scholars in the room at the end of the program. GSE 2006: Building A Bridge to Taiwan

When I first learned that the 2005 – 2006 GSE would be with Taiwan my heart started to pound. I had lived and worked in the island nation of 23 million for a couple of years during the early 1990's – and had discovered a warm and friendly land of exotic Asian culture combined with one of the most dynamic economies in the world. I had learned to speak the language fairly well, and felt close ties to culture.

Through the support and trust of my club, an outstanding GSE selection committee, and District Governor Phil Morris, I was granted the honor of leading the team. This was the beginning of a Rotary adventure that continues to unfold to this day.

Our GSE trip to Taichung, Taiwan was an enormous success. Our dynamic team – Linda, Heather, Gayle, and Christine – (Phil calls them our Dream Team) conducted themselves with professionalism, joy, and passion that endeared them to our hosts throughout the intense 30 day journey.

In Taiwan Rotary is strong. Our host district 3460 has 80 clubs - with a combined membership of around 3,500 members. During our GSE trip I think we met most of them!

Together we hiked mountains, toured great industrial empires, shared dreams with municipal leaders - and sang Karaoke at high volume on many a bouncing bus! We spent hours exploring the mysteries of politics, culture, and art with our new found friends – only to be dashed away in a fleet of luxury sedans, off with yet another Rotary club - new friends, new host families.



GSE is an intense and demanding experience that sometimes required us to dig deep inside to bridge the gap between our comfort zone and the intensity of immersion into a mysterious and foreign culture. As we neared the end of our trip, we had grown as individuals and as a team – and wished to stay just a little longer, to spend just a little more time with special new friends, to savor another tasty Taiwanese dish.

Now, we have returned to our jobs, families, and all of the activities that make up our busy lives. Yet, the experience of GSE in Taiwan lives on in our hearts.

Emails and phone calls are exchanged between our team and the incoming GSE team members now returned to Taiwan. There are exciting opportunities ahead for further exchange, such as the Ambassadorial scholarship generously endowed to our district by our hosts at 3460 – and a Rotary Friendship exchange in the works for later this year.

On behalf of the GSE team to Taiwan, I would like to thank all of the Rotarians in 7690 for providing us the opportunity to help build a bridge – and truly experience the Rotary message of Service Over Self.

FRIENDSHIP EXCHANGE

Are you interested in a trip to Taiwan? As I was preparing this final message for The Piedmont Rotarian I learned that our GSE partner District 3460 has expressed an interest in implementing a Friendship Exchange program with our district in the very near future.

What is Friendship Exchange? Rotary Friendship Exchange is Rotary's international exchange program for Rotarians and their families. Friendship Exchange provides participants the opportunity to experience other cultures by staying in the homes of Rotarians in other countries. The program aims to advance international understanding and peace through personal contact across borders while developing interclub relationships for fellowship and

service projects. A Friendship Exchange is similar to a Group Study Exchange in many ways. The differences are that it can be more flexibly structured and can be tailored to fit the needs of the participants, and that it is self-funded.

There are three types of Friendship Exchanges:

- **Visitor Program:** Individual Rotarians, who may be accompanied by family members, spend a few days in the home of a Rotarian in another country.
- **Team Program:** Rotarian couples, typically four to six, visit several communities in a host district for up to one month.
- **Uni-vocational:** Host and guest Rotarians of the same occupation

observe how their job is done in other countries.

There is a good chance that my counterpart in District 3460, Governor Tiger Ku, Stuart Fountain's counterpart, District Foundation Chairman John CK Wu, and another Rotarian (Bill) and their spouses will be spending a few weeks in our district. Will you open your homes to them? Do you want to send a team to visit Taichung? Our GSE team recommends their hospitality! When I have completed this article for TPR I will draft a letter to our friends in Taiwan to explore this possibility further. Let me know if you want to participate in the process.
